CONSERVATION

Now is a good time to look back over the past few years to see how the fish trap at Pelton Dam has functioned fish during the reintroduction period for the upper rivers above Lake Billy Chinook. The following table shows the counts for the various fish collected at the Pelton fish trap for the years 2019 thru part of 2023.

It appears to me the number of Steelhead is relatively stable with wild fish (approximately 10%) with origins above Lake Billy Chinook. The Smolt acclimating program for steelhead is adding significant numbers to this natural production for the tributary rivers and streams.

Spring Chinook numbers seem to fluctuate over a greater range. Fewer adults are wild fish (approximately 1.5% in 2022) with nearly equal numbers added by the smolt acclimation program in tributary streams and rivers above Lake Billy Chinook.

The sockeye returns are very low when you consider the large number of smolts passed thru the SWW facility on Lake Billy Chinook. This year the Sockeye total number exceeds the number of Spring Chinook arriving at the facility.

The reduction of fry planting in 2018 has reduced the number of steelhead and Chinook fish with origins in the streams above Lake Billy Chinook. The few reported fish in 2022 and 2023 are due to three ocean fish and possibly fish that reared in the freshwater for an extra year before beginning their trip to the ocean.

The fall Chinook numbers show a decrease over the past few years.

Low numbers of Bull Trout are passing the Pelton Trap, but there may be a slight increase in recent years. I am surprised and encouraged by the large number of Rainbow trout and there seems to be a significant increase in recent years.

FLY TYING

Basic Fly Tying Skills Classes

JAN & FEB, 2024

It's finally here! Registration for Members is now open on our COF website for the 6 Basic Skills Fly Tying in person classes. Tuesday evenings, 5:30 - 8:00 from Jan. 9th to Feb. 13th at Larkspur Center, Bend, in Classroom 2. Registration is required so that we can contact you with great info, fly videos or patterns for each class, and all the things that depend on good communications.

To Register, on the COF webpage, Login (if you don't yet have a login, you'll need to set one up - just

click on Login at the web page upper right corner, and follow directions provided) on

<https://www.coflyfishers.org>

Once on the website, under the Calendar & Events dropdown menu, click on Upcoming Events, then find Basic Skills classes and just follow the directions. There's a \$20 fee. Refundable if notification is received no later than Jan. 6th, 3 days (not the 2 days previously announced) before the first class on Jan 9th. Class Size limited to 12 tiers, first come, first served. Waiting list available.

All vises, tools and materials provided for in class use, as well as *substantial additional supporting information, both online and physical.*

The expanded schedule will allow a better handle on the basic skills needed to tie a greater range of fly tying techniques and effective, durable flies for local waters.

Class Schedule:

WEEK 1: Jan 9th; Brief discussion of tools, vises, thread & thread handling following up on several emails of tools and techniques sent out ahead of class. We'll be starting easy, a *Zebra Midge* and a *PT Perdigon*. All classes will include "How to fish" info. Tie 2 copies of each fly during class. Classes will build on techniques from all preceding classes (but you can catch up).

WEEK 2: Jan 16th; *Wooly Worm* and *Wooly bugger*. Discuss properties, advantages, and disadvantages of each material and patterns and their advantages in recognizing alternative materials and the good of "variants", as well as the new techniques involved.

WEEK 3: Jan 23rd; *Peacock and Partridge, and the Soft Hackle Wet Fly*. Discuss various types of hackle pliers, feathers, etc.

WEEK 4: Jan 30th; *Gold Ribbed Hairs Ear, and the Bead Head Pheasant Tail Nymph*. Discuss dubbing techniques, alternate materials, variants, and additional info.

WEEK 5: Feb 6th; *Parachute Adams, and a Rusty Spinner*. Discussion of hackles, winding hackle, winging techniques, body and tailing materials, variations using the same body and tailing to create emergers, and surface film considerations, etc.

WEEK 6: Feb 13th; Use of a *dubbing loop* for body and thorax using both natural and synthetic materials (e.g., Seal Bugger), *and one other fly demonstrating other valuable techniques*. TBD after consulting class on week 5.

There will be up to 8 loaner Renzetti Traveler pedestal style vises (one left handed), tool kits, and additional materials available for Registered class members who want to also tie at home. (Deposit required). Practice is a major Basic Skill! Prizes will be awarded to those doing the best at home work, weekly!

If you are an experienced tier, please give us a hand coaching our beginners.

Untangling Confusion: For future emails relating to these classes, please look for **COF Basic Fly Tying Skills** as part of the title. Although both of these are both sent out by Central Oregon Flyfishers, they are completely different than the **COFTG Zoom Winter Tying Classes**.

For winter fishing in Central Oregon, one of our best rivers is the Crooked, and I fish it a fair bit. If you would like to get educated on the various food sources and fishing methods in that river, check out COF member John Anderson's outstanding book "**Fly Fishing Oregon's Crooked River: Insect Drift and Seasonal Fish Diets as a Guide to Successful Fly Fishing**". I've read it cover to cover several times. We have a copy in the COF library in the Elks Lodge. I couldn't find it on Amazon, but the Deschutes Public Library lists 2 copies available. You also might try one of our local fly shops. And if you see John at a meeting, ask him about it! IMPROVED ZELON MIDGE

It is December so let's tie a midge. Since I mostly fish on the surface this month's pattern is the Improved Zelon Midge from Blue Ribbon Flies in West Yellowstone. BRF first describes a floating zelon midge on a 1990 pattern sheet with this improved version appearing in the 2005 new fly instructions. I have had good success on the Fall and Crooked with this midge pattern. Only two materials plus the hook and thread. It is easy to tie, floats well and is visible.

MATERIALS

HOOK: TMC 2488, #20, 22

THREAD: Uni 8/0 Olive dun or Danville 6/0 Olive

SHUCK & WING: Midge-gray straight zelon or Crippled Caddis Tan zelon

BODY: Working thread over the zelon shuck

THORAX: Midge black zelon dubbing

TYING INSTRUCTIONS

1. Crimp the barb, attach the thread and tie in a zelon shuck. Wrap back over the shuck with your thread slightly around the bend of the hook and then back to the wing position. Trim the shuck half the length of the hook.
2. Figure-8 a strand of zelon for the wing. Trim to the length of the hook shank.
3. Dub a thorax of midge black zelon dubbing. Here you have the choice to either figure 8 the dubbing around the wing like a spinner wing or dub in front of the wing forcing the fibers backwards. I prefer the figure 8 results.
4. Whip finish.

MATERIAL NOTES

I favor the TMC 2488 for small dry flies. With a straight eye, 2X short shank, and 3X wide gap it ties small but still hooks fish. Zelon and zelon dubbing are Blue Ribbon Fly materials. I believe it was Mike Lawson who said if you find a fly-tying material you can't live without then buy a lifetime supply. Shopping at Blue Ribbon since 1989 I've followed that advice very well.

I believe zelon dubbing is a mixture of rabbit, including the guard hairs, and zelon. Hare Tron, which is rabbit and Antron, and the many other fur and synthetic mixtures available today, should substitute well. Likewise, there are wing and shuck substitutes such as EP and EP Trigger Point or MFC's Widow's Web. EP's Trigger Point Fibers in Pale Morning Dun is similar in color and shade to midge gray zelon. I've been using EP Trigger Point on spinner wing patterns for a couple seasons. I haven't used either new material but Fulling Mill's ultra dry yarn and dry dub ultra used in recent Davie McPhail's tying videos look interesting for dry flies.
