Fly Fishing Crane Prairie Reservoir

Of all the presentations on fishing Crane Prairie I have seen over the years, Phil Fischer's is the best, and I look forward to seeing it again. As a bonus, Phil will give a fly tying demonstration of his favorite patterns before the meeting, so be sure to arrive early. Phil will lead us on a detailed tour of Crane Prairie and will share the techniques and fly patterns he uses throughout the seasons.

Phil Fischer is an avid fly tier, fly fisherman, photographer, and author. He lives in Sunriver, Oregon and spends time fly fishing the fabulous still waters in Central Oregon. He has fly fished extensively throughout the Western United States and numerous international destinations. He has been a regular demonstrator at several West Coast fly shows and often speaks at fly clubs in Oregon and Northern California.

When Phil was 10 years old, his dad bought him a fly tying kit for his birthday. He has never been far from a

vise since that day and now has over 45 years of fly fishing and fly tying experience. He owns Phil's Custom Trout Flies and has customers throughout the United States who count on his expertise in solving fly fishing puzzles on their own home waters.

Phil specializes in patterns for still waters in Central Oregon. His Callibaetis Life Cycle patterns consistently catch fish and are in high demand. These flies have been featured in several publications and tying instructions can be viewed online at his YouTube page. Phil also contributes a monthly fly tying column to the Sunriver Anglers.

CONSERVATION

Now is a good time to look back over the past year and look over what went well in my life. I got involved in the Mayfly Project where experienced fly fishers introduce some foster kids to the art of fly fishing. This group is a little younger than the week long fishing camp the club sponsors at the ODFW kids fishing pond near Camp Sherman. The group is a little younger, but the addition of 3 foot long practice rods with yarn line and Velcro ends to snag fabric fish kept the younger kids entertained and aided in teaching these young kids the mechanics of casting a fly rod. The program sponsors six outings to teach the kids the basics of fly fishing. The outings are scattered thru the summer at different locations. The kids enjoyed the program and many made significant improvement in their fly fishing skills. I think all had the joy of hooking and landing some trout from local ponds and rivers. Some have already signed up for the class to further their skills next year. One has agreed to become a instructor to aid in teaching some of the other kids. This program meets Fred's objective of teaching some of the younger people of interest who do not have as much grey hair as most of our members. I would encourage other members to join this group and invest a little time next year in teaching and training the next generation of fly fishers. EDUCATION

Happy New Year everyone! To start the 2024, I've got some videos on streamer fishing that should provide some good info, as well as some entertainment for you.

In this video from The New Fly Fisher recorded in 2001, Kelly Galloup discusses the triggers for big trout using streamers. He had recently published his book, Modern Streamers for Trophy Trout, and at the time was still living in Michigan. It is an informative and interesting article that looks at what makes big fish attack a streamer. Some of the material about fly lines is a little dated, but the basic theory is still applicable to today's fishing. I think you'll find it worth your time to watch it.

This next video describes how to use RIO's fly clips and twist clips; I find them useful for fishing streamers and larger wet flies when I don't feel like tving a lot of knots (like when it's cold outside!). Both of these allow your fly to hang and move freely, just like using a loop knot. https://www.youtube.com/

now OH!! Snow where are you. As I write this out my window the ground looks like it is late fall, nothing on the ground except the morning frost. Let us pray for snow, the sooner the better.

This month's fly comes from having to spend more time off the water this past year, than on. So, I spent the time building flies to fit the problems that I have seeing more of the past few years. The BWO Prince came about with the need for a different looking BWO emerger pattern. The fish seemed to not want to break the surface to feed and were taking the bugs as they were ascending to hatch. There is a lot going on when this happens, with most bugs starting their emergence well below the surface. This is where this fly does its job.

The fly is fished on a dry line, leaders, (10 to 15 feet) and lite 3 ft of (5X and 6X) tippet. If you use dry fly dressing on the fly, do it lightly, we want this fly to lie just below the surface, 3 to 12 inches. This can be achieved by dressing the last 12 inches of the tippet with some nymph mud or mud from the banks of the water you are fishing. When fishing this method make sure when dressing the tippet, do not dress any closer to the fly than 2 inches, the sinking muds cause a stiffness in the tippet and will not allow the fly to swim properly, if dress up against the fly and please use a loop knot, they allow the fly to work better and drag will be less of a problem.

MATERIALS

Hook: #12 to #16 Dry fly hook TMC 2312, 200R work if that is what

you have.

Thread: 14/0 light dun **Tail:** Natural lemon duck

BODY: Light to med. BWO olive, match the hatch. **Ribbing:** Tying thread colored brown with maker

pen.

Thorax: Peacock herl small

Legs: Partridge the brown feathers off the back **Wing:** Goose biots light to dark dun, match the hatch

Head: Tying thread color same as the rib

TYING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Start the thread just behind the hook eye and lay down a thread base to the hook bend. Make sure you have a long tag that will be used for the rib.
- 2. Tye in the tails keeping the thread wraps to a minimum, raise the tails up and put 2 wraps of thread in front of the tails. The butts of the tail will be tyed in over the back of the body.
- 3. Now dub the body forward to the 2/3rds point of the hook. It should be slim and tapered. There needs to room for the thorax, legs, and the wing.
- 4. Bring the butts of the tail over the top of the body and wrap the rib in tight turns and tye off at the end of the body.
- Tye in the peacock herl and wrap thorax forward leaving space for leg hackle and wings.
- 6. Strip the barbs from one side of the partridge hackle and tye in by the tip, take 2 to 3 wraps depending on hook size, and tye off.
- 7. Pick 2 biots the length of the body and tye them in keeping them over the back and slightly V'ed.
- 8. Now finish with a small neat head, of tying thread.
