Deschutes Land Trust Presentation

The Deschutes Land Trust is one of the first organizations I joined, after COF, when I moved to Central Oregon in 2004. Their still ongoing effort to save Skyline Forest from development is what first attracted me, but their impressive work conserving important aquatic habitat has kept me donating all these years. They have conserved lands and created multiple preserves along Whychus Creek, the Metolius, the Crooked River and its tributaries, Trout Creek, etc. Their latest preserve contains part of Paulina Creek with a long-term vision to restore and reconnect the creek to the Little Deschutes River.

This month we will hear from Rika Ayotte, the DLT's Executive Director, and Gonzalo Mendez, a member of their board of directors. They will give an overview of the DLT and discuss their established projects and those currently in development that have a direct and positive impact on fish.

Rika is a native Oregonian and a Central Oregon resident since 2015. Along with managing the DLT, she serves on the Boards of the Deschutes Trails Coalition, the Global Leadership Adventures International Foundation, and the Bend Cultural Tourism Fund Commission.



Gonzalo has been a professional fish biologist for 20 years. He is currently with Portland General Electric at the Pelton Round Butte Project near Madras where he has been a key member of the anadromous fish reintroduction project working on juvenile fish migration.

CONSERVATION

Fish Stocks for Whychus Creek

For this month I will talk about the USFS and ODFW report on fish stocks for the Whychus Creek project above and below the Camp Polk area. Stocking of rainbow trout fry was stopped in 2018 when ODFW switched to a smolt stocking program for the stream.

The stream above Sisters was sampled at least three times. Once in 2014 before Chinook salmon fry were planted into the stream the stream consisted of 100% rainbow trout. Once in 2016 after Chinook salmon were planted into the stream the stream consisted of 13% Chinook Salmon and 87% rainbow trout. In 2022 the stream was sampled and the fish

population consisted of 17% brook trout, 16% brown trout and 67% rainbow trout. When the trout fry were stocked the stream consisted of many small (under 6" in length) rainbow trout. In 2022 the size of the rainbow trout increased to a maximum of 10 inches with a smaller population of under 4 inch long brown trout using the section. The total number of rainbow trout decreased drastically after the ending of the fry stocking program. During the stocking program for fry the population density of redband trout increased by 7 times the pre-stocking densities. After the stocking program ended the population density decreased drastically.

Whychus Creek was sampled below Camp Polk in the Wychus Canyon area three times. Once in 2015 before introduction of Chinook Salmon. the stream consisted of 40% brown trout and 60% rainbow trout. Once in 2018 after introduction of Chinook Salmon fry, the stream consisted of 31% brown trout, 19% Chinook salmon and 50% rainbow trout. A final sampling was completed in 2022 when the fish population in the stream consisted of 1% Chinook Salmon, 11% rainbow trout and 88% brown trout. It appears the non native brown trout prefer this lower section of the stream with warmer slower water. From 2018 to 2022 the number of brown trout increased, but the size decreased. The result of the stream improvements was to triple the number of small (under 4 inch length) brown trout in this section. During the stocking program for redband fry the population density doubled for the improved section of this stream. After the stocking program ended the population density decreased drastically.

The Whychus Canyon section was sampled in two areas. Reach R3 consisted on an unimproved section with few pools and no side channels and large substrate (gravel size). This section had a population of ½ to ¼ the population of brown trout compared to the improved reach R4 section. The R4 section was described as containing many pools, side channels and abundant large wood structures. This shows the quick response to stream improvements in total fish populations.

The study had 4 conclusions;

#1 Redband Trout numbers were low in 2022

#2 Habitat improvement projects have not increased redband trout densities

#3 Brown trout population is increasing with higher abundance in habitat improvement areas.

#4 Redband trout recruitment is low (possibly due to sediment in springtime).

FLY TYING

Winter Fly Tying BASIC SKILLS AND WINTER FLY TYING, 11/2023

After further efforts to solve various technical issues, looks like we've hit a wall with plans for Winter Fly Tying. Very sorry, but after clearing 3 - 4 hurdles, ran smack into #5 and caught a glimpse of #6. Looks like WFT just won't be ready to present decent quality Zoom sessions. No good in putting out less than quality classes for our members. Cancelling it this year, but may try again in 2025.

Basic Skills, in person, is still alive and well. In fact, we are looking into expanding it to 6 sessions. So, Tuesdays in January (9th, 16th, 23rd, and 30th), and the first two Tuesdays in February

(6th & 13th). These would be held at Classroom 2, Larkspur Community Center, from 5:30 - 8:00PM. This will give us more time to offer techniques to tie good looking, durable fishing flies. Locally successful flies, with techniques common to hundreds of flies, how and why they work, and how and where to fish them.

Registration info will be sent out in 3 – 4 weeks. Registration is required for us to be able to send additional info, provide materials for the classes, and any necessary updates. Planning on room for 12 attendees, with a waiting list. There will be a \$20 registration fee that will cover either a 4 or 6 session series of classes. Refundable if we are notified within 2 days of the first class. Some vise and tool kits will be available for loan, but must be returned by end of Basic Skills classes.

We have 4 volunteer tying instructors so far, but would really do best with another 2 - 3. Fly tyers in COF, remember we all started out at the beginning of the learning curve. Help teach others to get into this great part of the sport of fly fishing, as others helped you.

EDUCATION

Kokanee Karnival Youth Education Program SEPTEMBER 25 - 29

The Fall Streamside field trips at Sheep Bridge (Deschutes River at Wickiup) and Spring Creek (Metolius River) were a big success. Redmond, Terrebonne, Bend and Sunriver 5th graders learned all about a local watershed. At Spring Creek the highlight was wading in the stream and collecting aquatic insects. They also conducted water quality experiments, measured dissolved oxygen, pH and temperature. The fluorescent flow tracing dye demonstration was also a big hit.

At Sheep Bridge, students observed kokanee salmon spawning in the wild and learned about kokanee life cycle and habitat. The Sunriver Anglers hosted field trips at Fall River hatchery.

Altogether 350 students, and 11 teachers participated in the Fall Streamside field trips.

The key to success of this program was excellent volunteers! Everyone contributes their own unique background and this improves the program each year.

BOARD BITS

A REVIEW OF THE COF BOD RETREAT - 10/23/23

2024 Budget - Tim S presented the 2024 budget proposal. As written, it projects a net loss of around \$1500. In reality, we usually have greater income than projected or we have less expenses than projected, so there is no net loss at year's end. Philosophically, are we OK with a net loss on paper? The BOD is OK with it. The budget was approved.

Grant Procedures – We have \$3000 in the budget for grants. In the past, this has been used for chub removal, interns, the Metolius pond, Casting for Recovery, Steelhead Falls work, etc. For consideration, a grant application must meet the mission of the club. We need better advertisement about applying for a grant. Yancy will write an article for our newsletter. A policy will be formulated for the Board Book. A note will be added to our new brochure.

Banquet/Auction – Tim S. had previously emailed his and Renee's proposal to move the Banquet/Auction to the Bend Golf Club. It will cost around \$6200. The Bend River House is much higher in price and the Elks Club did not perform well last year. Dinner at BGC would cost around \$62. It was proposed to subsidize part of the meal and charge \$45 to attendees. The date is March 23. The proposal was accepted. We still have a few unsold items from last year. We will save them for 2024.

Sportsman's Show – March 7,8,9,10 – We need a coordinator. The new volunteer will receive lots of help from the BOD! Please think about it!

New Brochure – Tim S – Kelly has worked up a

proposal for the new brochure...cost is \$100 for her work. Verbiage needs to be a little more generic. Some photos need to be changed. Tim will bring an update to the Jan meeting.

Monthly Raffle – The BOD really likes having a monthly raffle. Coral Ann and LeeAnn have run the raffle in the past. They will be contacted for info. Sierra Trading Post, local fly shops and donations from members have been used in the past for items. It was suggested that we put \$100 in the budget. Generally, \$100 is what has been made, so it would be a wash. Jack and John volunteered to facilitate the raffle. Allen and Bob volunteered to be their subs. The raffle will start in January.

Elections – Kari had previously submitted a Slate of Officers to the BOD by email. It was accepted. Mary will email the election to COF members around the end of Oct. The results will be announced at the Nov monthly members meeting.

Education – Tim Q – Please help Tim out with ideas for classes. Budget is \$1200. A discussion was held about underwriting partial costs of the classes. Yes, we will underwrite partial costs, but always charge something to make the classes more valuable. Cancellations – if you must cancel, you will get your money back up to 2 days before the class is held. If you send a check for the class, rather than paying online, it must be received up to a week before the class takes place or you will be cancelled.

Wild Women of the Water – Sue – Holiday party is Dec 3.

Website – Mary – some website costs have gone up, some have gone down…

Programs – 2024 schedule is coming together. Let Yancy know if you have suggestions.

December Holiday party – Dec 20 – Elks Club is now not available. Mary is checking on options.

Outings – Allen – a discussion was held on procedures. Please let Allen know if you have outings suggestions.

Winter Fl Ttying – John – 6 Basic Skills classes will be held in January and February at Larkspur. The Advanced ZOOM class is unlikely. Sherry Steele is doing her classes over ZOOM and has invited COF to

join her.

Conservation – Tom S – he is continuing with the Mayfly Project and will promote that. Tom will continue working with the Bend Parks & Rec to get the fly-casting pond established at Discovery Park in the summers. The targets are already built.

FILM CRITIC BWO 2023

MATERIALS

HOOK DAICHII: 1160 sizes 18-20

TAIL Shuck: lt olive sparkle yarn.

BODY: olive thread.

THORAX: superfine dubbing, BWO.

POST: olive dun thread, EP Trigger Point. white.

HACKLE: medium dun or grizzly

his is a modified version of a pattern I submitted about 4/5 years ago and is a much easier to tie. I have found this to be a very effective pattern during BWO hatches.

This fly style was developed by Bob Quigley and with appropriate color alterations is very effective across the range of mayflies.

To fish this style of fly add floatant to just the hackle and thorax area. The rear/abdomen will penetrate the film imitating a mayfly struggling to hatch or perhaps a cripple. It may look like an

easy meal to the fish or possibly be visible from a greater distance due to the abdomen below the film. Tied as below, the fly is very durable and floats very well.

TYING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Start the thread on the shank just above the hook point and wrap to the rear to a point about half way down the curve of the hook.
- 2. Tie in the emerger yarn and wrap back up the shank to the tie in point
- 3. Tie in a one inch piece of EP Trigger Point fiber (about the width of the hook gap) leaving about 1/8 inch towards the front. Wrap the thread to a point just behind the eye of the hook and return to the where the body starts.
- 4. I use four loops of thread to make the post. Refer to the YouTube video for a visual.
- 5. Tie in a feather (I use a feather the same size as the hook) and wrap it up the post and back down. Measure the amount of hackle needed by tipping the post towards the eye. The wrapped hackle needs to reach just behind the eye when the post is tipped forward. Tie off by wrapping the thread around the post. Trim the EP fibers in the rear to 1/16".
- 6. Dub the thorax with Superfine BWO dubbing
- 7. Pull the post and hackle over the thorax and secure with a few loose wraps. Pull the thread loops forward to tighten the hackle against the thorax. Add a few wraps of thread and tighten. Lift the post and wrap some thread in front to make it stand up. Trim the post even with the top of the hackle.
