
CONSERVATION

The Round Butte Hatchery

The Round Butte Hatchery was started about 50 years ago when the three dams forming the three lakes (Lake Billy Chinook, Simtustus Lake and Reregulating Dam) were constructed. A fish ladder was constructed to allow passage of salmon and steelhead at the three dams, but the design did not function well. A series of concrete cells were constructed at various elevations in the canyon in an attempt to allow the fish to pass the dams. While the adult fish did not use the ladder cells, people at PGE and ODFW used a few of the cells to raise about 20,000 Chinook smolts per year for the first years. Later when the newer fish passage structure (SWW Surface Water Withdrawal) system was constructed the target number of Chinook smolts was raised to 100,000 by adding facilities at the Fall River and Wizard Falls Hatcheries. One of the presentations at the PGE fish conference in July 2023 was by Dian Spangenberg and Deborah Harstad of NOAA. Their presentation focused on the size of Chinook smolts and return rate for the different groups from the Round Butte Hatchery.

The standard rearing protocol was to raise smolts to a 8 fish per pound size before release. These fish would make the out migration to Bonneville in a few days less than the smaller smolts raised at 15 fish per pound. The smaller fish would allow about 64% more smolts to be raised in the ponds or raceways used at the hatcheries. The study was conducted over a few years to track the out migration and the return rate of the different size Chinook smolts to the hatchery.

Monitoring the out migration by radio tags provided interesting data. The larger smolts had a greater number of mini-jacks (fish who attempted to



return to the hatchery ponds without making a trip to the ocean thru Bonneville Dam). There was also a higher percentage of jack salmon (fish returning after only one summer in the ocean) from the larger smolt size group. The smaller smolt size group actually returned a greater number of 2 ocean fish (60% increase) than the larger smolts due to the greater number of smolts that were raised in the fixed size of the hatchery ponds. When extended to 4 year old fish (3 ocean fish) the advantage became even greater with a 150% increase for equal cell size populations.

NOAA recommended raising more smaller smolts to improve the return of larger 2 and 3 ocean fish to the hatchery. Studies like this will continue to aid hatchery personnel to build a good Chinook salmon program at the Round Butte Hatchery.

Tuesday Oct 17 2:00-3:30 in Realms classroom and an outdoor space: Dante and Anita present

- 5 min: introductions and overview of COF
- 10 min: discussion with visuals and/or actual gear on the differences between flyfishing vs spinners (hooks, reels, nets, flies vs bait, waters, catch and release, when and why would you choose one or the other)
- 5 min: volunteers share their experience and maybe some pics or video
- 10 min: model practice casting and/or share some video of the technique stopping video to explain
- 60 min: practice casting followed by challenges where students try to have their cast land inside a hoop at different distances and locations




FOR SALE: FISH CAT COUGAR PONTOON

I ummer through late Fall in Central Oregon is a good time to fish lakes with chronomids/midges. Most of the major hatches are finished leaving a healthy population of midges for the trout and, yes, kokanee. The Duck Tape pattern was developed by John Kent in British Columbia, Canada. Steve Anderson (John Anderson's son) shared this pattern with me this summer on East Lake. It is a blood worm imitation and is very effective for trout and kokanee in East Lake. It has accounted for hundreds of trout and kokanee this summer and early fall. During the summer, the surface temperature in East Lake reaches nearly 70F. The oxygen content of the warm water is too low for larger trout and kokanee. The larger trout and kokanee move to deeper water in the lake's thermocline for a more favorable oxygen level. Typically, the thermocline is around 30-36' in East Lake. The trout and kokanee feed mostly on bloodworms during this time. The best way to fish at these depths is to use the Dangling method. Google "dangling fishing" for good instructional videos on how to use this

method. I use a modified drop shot method as a substitute. Google "John Kent's Duck Tape" for directions and recipe for the fly pattern. As for colors, red is the standard (Brown trout love red) but blood worms in East are a dark red (I use burgundy holographic tinsel instead of red holographic tinsel). For the "thorax " I use a base of light olive thread covered with medium mirage opal tinsel. I use size 14 2x long streamer/nymph hooks. I use size 11 silver lined red glass beads for the head. Bead stores in Bend should have that color. If you can't find it Patient Angler may be able to order them. I substitute red flashabou for the holographic red tinsel because it is more durable (you will catch a lot of fish on this fly). I coat the fly with Sally Hansen's Hard as Nails for durability. (Here is a bonus fly to look up on the internet – John Kent's Hog Magnet.)
